There is no other place like Gallaudet in the world!





What Was It Like in 1864?

At the time of the establishment of the collegiate department of Columbia Institution for the Deaf and Dumb (now known as Gallaudet University) in 1864, Washington, D.C. was different from what it is today.

- Civil War was underway in its third year... lots of soldiers in the Capital city, and the city was heavily protected by about 60 military forts all around.
- The Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Station was the only gateway for soldiers to arrive in the city. The present Union Station was nowhere to be found.
- Kendall Green was located just outside of the city limits. There was a military hospital camp erected on the property.
- The L'Enfant plan for Washington D.C. was not adhered to. The thousands of trees in the city that we see today were absent.
- The construction on the U.S. Capitol's new cast iron dome was just completed.
- Washington Monument was still unfinished.
- Many roads were unpaved, including Boundary Street (now Florida Avenue) in front of Kendall Green.
- West Virginia Ave along the side of Kendall Green was non-existent. What was there before? Look at the 1865 map on the next page.





The Rose Cottage, also known as the "Cradle of Gallaudet," was where college students took classes 1864-1866.



The Baltimore & Ohio railroad station in the Capital City. The Nation's first railroad, B&O, completed a 32-mile branch line between Baltimore & Washington in 1835.



This 4-4-0 steam locomotive drew Lincoln's Funeral Train. (*The "4-4-0" means* **4** *leading wheels,* **4** *driving wheels, and* **0** *trailing wheels.*)

Did you know?

On May 24, 1844, **Samuel F. B. Morse** sent the first telegram, "**WHAT HATH GOD WROUGHT**," over wires from the U.S. Capitol to the B&O station and then on to Baltimore along the right of way of the B&O railroad. **Yes**, the telegram went along the side of Kendall Green.



For his inauguration in 1861, President-elect **Abraham Lincoln** took his first train ride lasting 12 days from his home in Springfield, Illinois, to the B&O station in the Federal City. In 1865, his funeral train left the same station following the same train route back home. **Yes**, both trains passed along the side of Kendall Green.

... In the 1880s - 1900s



The 1903 Baist map shows that the B&O Railroad yard, including the roundhouse for servicing steam locomotives, is located right next to Kendall Green.


In response to the City Beautiful movement, B&O proposed moving its station north to the intersection of Boundary Street (renamed as Florida Avenue in 1890) and Delaware Avenue. This plan called for a new route going THROUGH the grounds of Kendall Green and Mrs. Patterson (next door). President Edward Miner Gallaudet protested against this proposal.


The proposal of having a single train terminal (Union Station) for all railroads serving in the city far outweighed all other proposals, and was supported by Congress and President "Teddy" Rooseevelt in 1901.

Union Station was opened in 1907. A new tunnel was built under 1st Street to channel trains running between Union Station and South, and to shorten the B&P route from Baltimore to Washington.



Thankfully, both B&O and B&P depots were replaced, and new tracks were built north and west of Kendall Green. The vacant roadbed of the old B&O tracks along the side of the Columbia Institution (now Gallaudet University) was named West Virginia Avenue in 1908.

This **College Building**, built in 1866, is the oldest surviving structure on Kendall Green. It was later renovated and became a part of the newly built structure called **College Hall** (1877). It is now known as the **East Wing of College Hall**



In 1864-1866, college students took classes in the Rose Cottage on the right, also known as the "Cradle of Gallaudet", prior to the completion of the new College Building on the left in 1866.



Both College Building (1866) and Chapel Hall (1871) stood side by side.



Dawes House (1886), designed by Olof Hanson of Class 1886, was first used as a dorm for Kendall School boys. The building is named after Henry L. Dawes who served in Congress for 36 years (1857-1893): 9 terms as Congressman and 3 terms as Senator. He served on Gallaudet Board for 34 years (1869-1903).











What is changed and future for Gallaudet?



Gallaudet University continues to review the future plans in the light of its mission and enrollment. The 10-year Facilities Master Plan was recently updated to address possible changes on Kendall Green through 2022.

In addition, Gallaudet University has been involved with the plans for the future of the Capital City Market (25 acres total) west of Kendall Green. Gallaudet owns almost 4 acres in the market area.

The Gallaudet 2022 Campus Plan is a ten-year update to our existing 2012 Facilities Master Plan required by the District of Columbia Zoning Commission. The 2022 Campus Plan articulates the university's vision for the campus and provides guidance for the physical development of campus facilities.

The Gallaudet University Board of Trustees approved the scope and intent of the 2022 Campus Plan during their May 2012 meeting, and the university moved forward with the zoning application with the assistance of consultant teams Stantec, Dangermond Keane Architecture, Symmetra Design, and legal counsel Holland & Knight.



This illustration gives an idea as to what a new campus gateway at the corner of Florida Avenue and the 6th Street might look like.

New buildings bridge to surrounding neighborhoods and to the city by creating a new, dramatic, wide pedestrian entrance to the University - "Olmsted Gate"- from the corner of Florida and 6th Street,



Union Market was established in 1931 and has been renovated as the new Capital City Market.

For the west side of 6th Street, the development is now undergoing dramatic transformation of this area, With neighborhood serving retail and business services and possibly multi-family rental housing. It creates a campus vision that integrates Gallaudet with the community while facilitating on- and off-campus development.



The Union Market has a bright future as defined by people, passion and will be Gallaudet's discovery destination.

Planning Principles

Gallaudet University established the Office of Campus Design and Planning in 2009 to guide the future development of campus grounds and buildings with an inclusive and integrated approach. Thoughtful stewardship and campus development is implemented through innovative partnerships with campus and community stakeholders often with the assistance of respected design and construction professionals. A full range of design and planning services as well as campus design standards are provided to the Gallaudet community to ensure that physical assets support program needs within a campus setting expressive of the historic legacy while building a sustainable campus of the future as a model.

2012 Facilities Master Plan

The 2002-2012 Facilities Master Plan serves to establish a framework for the development of capital projects to support the role, mission, and academic vision of Gallaudet University. This Facilities Master Plan is proactive and responsive, and communicates the key issues of density, adjacency, circulation, green and open space, and the impact of the University upon the adjoining community. The four major goals of the Facilities Master Plan are to:

- Provide a campus plan for the university and the Board of Trustees that articulates the university's vision for the campus.
- Continue to build upon the relationship of the university, the community, and the District of Columbia.
- Provide guidance for the physical development of the campus.
- Fulfill the requirements for the submission of a Master Plan Document to the District of Columbia Zoning Commission.

Gallaudet University has been an active and vital part of the city and both have benefited from the economic, cultural, and educational aspects of this partnership. The relationship of Gallaudet to its neighborhood is important; Gallaudet University is an integral part of the city and the Master Plan approach recognizes the University's desire to continue its role within the community.

Campus Plan Development

All new buildings and renovation are based on DeafSpace design concepts, accessibility and campus life. Deaf people inhabit a rich sensory world where vision and touch are a primary means of spatial awareness and orientation such as follows:

- 1. Sensory reach
- 2. Space and mobility proximity
- 3. Light and color
- 4. Acoustics

In support of these planning principles, highlights of the 2022 Campus Plan include:

- Renovation of three historic campus buildings which are part of the Gallaudet College Historic district (a part of the U.S. National Historic Landmark district)
- Creation of a new pedestrian entrance to campus from the corner of Florida Avenue and 6th Street Northeast.
- Construction of a new residence hall for the Model Secondary School for the Deaf, a residential high school program located on campus.
- Establishment of a new student learning commons to replace the library on the current site of EMG Memorial Building.
- Refurbishment of the "Gallaudet Mall" to enhance the space as an outdoor gathering area.


